Our vision is to elevate Sarasota as a leader in preserving and promoting design innovation that transforms places and inspires lives. Our mission is to steward the legacy of the Sarasota School of Architecture and provide a forum for the education, advocacy, and celebration of good design in the global built environment.

Grounded in the Sarasota School of Architecture's tradition of creativity, experimentation, and modern design, the organization's strategy unites research with practical applications that inspire new ways of thinking about the built environment. We strive to engage as many people as possible in our work.

The Strategic Framework: 2030 outlines the values, principles, and priorities that will help focus our actions. As we implement this strategy, Architecture Sarasota is demonstrating how design can help direct change by connecting people and place, past and future, and local and global.

Bridging vision with community-informed action, the organization has developed a model approach that enables projects, initiatives, and programs to emanate from transformational research and design strategies. This work is undertaken both internally by a qualified and experienced team and through dynamic partnerships. Collaborations with a diverse range of private entities and public agencies have allowed Architecture Sarasota to refine its approach, engaging the local community in meaningful ways while connecting with and contributing to an international network of ideas and invention.

Announced in spring 2024, Moderns That Matter invited residents and stakeholders to identify the Sarasota 100, a list of buildings and places—both historic and contemporary—considered priorities for preservation and advocacy. Complementing this civic-led effort, the annual Philip Hanson Hiss Award, established in 2021, celebrates pioneering figures in design and preservation. Honorees such as Lord Norman Foster (2024) and the World Monuments Fund (2026) have expanded the organization's reach, enabling Sarasota to share its architectural legacy with an international audience.

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


Finances

Since the merger in 2021, Architecture Sarasota has more than doubled its annual revenue.

Our members are over 500, with 20% at the advocate level and above.

The organization is maintaining assets of over \$1 million.





SARASOTA SCHOOL LEGACY

Documenting, celebrating, and safeguarding 100 years of the Sarasota School of Architecture (c.1925-2025) to ensure Sarasota remains a global epicenter of design innovation.

The most exciting new architecture in the world is being done in Sarasota by a group of young architects.

HENRY RUSSELL HITCHCOCK, THE ARCHITECTURAL REVIEW (1952) Sarasota School of Architecture is an active continuum of modernist design innovation that resonates today. The movement gained international recognition for its adaptation of modernism to the sub-tropical climate, geography, building traditions, and cultural context of southwest Florida's Gulf Coast. A current generation of Sarasota School designers are evoking and evolving the movement's principles.

Though often referred to in the past tense, the

Architecture Sarasota serves as a steward of this legacy while fostering dialogue about design's role in shaping sustainable and resilient communities. In 2023, we launched the *Reimagining Pei Competition*, challenging designers to "boldly transform" renowned architect I.M. Pei's Dormitories at New College. From a field of 30 responses to a "Request for Qualifications," three finalists were chosen: STUDIOS, Brooks + Scarpa, and the competition winner Sweet Sparkman Architecture & Interiors.

In 2024, in partnership with the Sarasota Art Museum, Hampton University, and Damien Blumetti Architect, we led a study of Victor Lundy's former 1959 Galloway's Furniture Showroom.

The outcomes of the project were presented in Modern Masterpiece Uncovered. This exhibition reintroduced the building to a generation who only knew the site in its contemporary existence as Visionworks, which no longer resembles the boundary-pushing original design. The exhibition concluded with a digital reconstruction and offered a glimpse into the structure's potential future.

Architecture Sarasota is currently working on a documentary series, Sarasota School: A Living Legacy that highlights four new buildings that demonstrate the continuation of the movement and underscore its ongoing relevance in the 21st century.

Located in Key Largo, Florida, the Van der Vlugt Residence by STRANG is the first project highlighted in the Sarasota School: Living Legacy documentary series currently in development.

Great cities do more than grow. They foster invention and support a vibrant public life. They are accessible, walkable, and healthy.

Sarasota stands at a juncture of rapid change. The choices we make now regarding architecture, infrastructure, and civic spaces will shape our city for generations to come.

Architecture Sarasota has taken a leadership role in advancing this conversation to achieve outcomes that reflect the aspirations of its residents and those who care for our community.

In 2024 and 2025, Architecture Sarasota hosted a two-part series, "Downtown Sarasota: Hindsight, Insight, and Foresight" and "Beyond Our Borders." This public forum brought urban planners, thinkers, and designers together with residents to explore the future of Sarasota. The City Commission later cited the series as a "catalyst" in deciding to move forward with a new master plan.

The experts who participated in the Downtown Sarasota series identified the Bayfront as an area that deserved attention.

In response, Architecture Sarasota partnered with Harvard

University's Graduate School of Design to study the area and produce a toolkit for reimagining the waterfront as a sustainable, resilient, and connected public space. That toolkit will now guide public workshops, ensuring the Bayfront reflects the community's vision through design excellence.

The focus area of the Harvard Bayfront Study stretched from the Quay (northern boundary) to Selby Gardens (southern boundary) and extended into lower Main Street.



Coastal communities like Sarasota are increasingly vulnerable to shifting environmental impacts, including more frequent flooding and extreme heat. Resilience requires a proactive approach to conserving both natural and cultural resources and community assets through the design, implementation, and monitoring of adaptation strategies. It also requires a quick response in the aftermath of a disaster.

In 2023, in partnership with New College of Florida,
Architecture Sarasota launched the New College Challenge,
engaging six top-tier design schools to reimagine the campus
ahead of its 2060 centennial. The Challenge provided a
model for climate- and coastal-ready design rooted in culture
and place. The outcomes of the initiative contributed to a new
master plan, components of which are being implemented now.

Last year, within 72 hours of Hurricane Helene's arrival on our shores, Architecture Sarasota launched its Restoring a Sense of Place intiative, a comprehensive program to support owners and stewards of historic structures through five key actions: property documentation, conditions assessment, information sharing, emergency landmark designations, and adaptation strategies to enhance resilience. Because of this initiative, significant Sarasota School and other properties have been spared demolition and structures whose damage was determined too great for repair were documented in accordance with well-established preservation best-practices. The value of this program has just been recognized with a Citation of Merit by the 2025 Docomomo US Modernism in America Awards.





Across Florida and the nation, the need for affordable, dignified housing is urgent and largely unmet.

Answering this challenge requires us to look forward while also learning from past efforts. In particular, the Sarasota School, from its inception, has often used housing as a means of architectural and design experimentation.

Today, millions of Americans, especially Floridians, live in manufactured homes. They remain essential yet often undervalued assets amid rising land values and redevelopment pressures. For example, approximately 57,000 year-round residents of Sarasota County (over 7% of the population) reside in a manufactured home. Recognizing their value and prevalence locally and beyond, Architecture Sarasota launched the initiative Modern Dwelling: Manufactured Housing Communities of Sarasota, Florida, which inventoried 60 communities and identified 10 as potentially eligible for the National Register of Historic Places. This study revealed that these often-overlooked neighborhoods serve as both attainable housing options and cultural resources.

St. Paul Lutheran Church is a campus featuring three landmark buildings designed by architect Victor Lundy. Architecture Sarasota is collaborating with the congregation to explore new possibilities for the site, including the introduction of affordable and accessible housing for residents and workers, as well as other potential uses. The project employs the concept of regenerative heritage, focused on preserving historic places while renewing them to strengthen the community's social, cultural, environmental, and economic well-being.

Moderns That Matter Matter

Sarasota has long distinguished itself as a place where arts and architecture thrive. As the region grows, the decisions we make about what to preserve and adapt will shape its identity for decades.

Moderns That Matter was created to honor this sense of place. Through an extensive survey and broad community input, 100 significant sites were selected and organized chronologically across ten categories. Announced on March 20, 2024, the Sarasota 100 now provides Architecture Sarasota with a foundation for its efforts on behalf of education, preservation, and advocacy.



Now in its 12th year, MOD Weekend brings together architects, historians, designers, and the public for lectures, tours, and discussions that highlight both iconic and lesser-known modern buildings. More than a retrospective, the festival is a platform for exploring how modernist principles can inform contemporary practice and inspire future solutions.

As one of the nation's leading modern architecture events, Sarasota MOD positions the city as both a guardian of history and a laboratory for new ideas.

Umbrella House Conservation Management Plan



Robert L. Peters (1954–2023) was a graphic designer, educator, writer, and advocate for design. An early proponent for sustainable approaches and living, Peters' firm CIRCLE earned over 60 awards under his direction. His book *Worldwide Identity* is a global survey of graphic identity from forty countries that advances contextually grounded, socially responsible design. Peters is one among many visionaries whose philosophy and belief in the power of design inspires the work of Architecture Sarasota.

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Founded in 2021 through the uniting of Sarasota's two premier design advocacy organizations, **Architecture Sarasota** has rapidly grown into a leader in preserving good design in the built environment while stewarding the legacy of the Sarasota School.
